Members co-facilitate carer awareness training alongside our Health Link, Jan Box. Health and social care staff learn about the carer's experience from listening to the carers story so this is an extremely valuable element of carer awareness training. Before taking part in sessions carers are provided with training and there is ongoing support. Health and social care staff tell us that listening to the carer changes the way they work with carers. Crimes committed against someone because of their disability, transgender-identity, race, religion or belief, or sexual orientation are hate crimes and should be reported to the police. The police take hate crimes very seriously and will record and investigate these offences which can include name calling or verbal abuse, graffiti or abusive writing, damage to property, threats or intimidation, threats or intimidation, bullying or harassment, physical attacks or violence. You can report hate crime via Tel no 101, on-line third-party reporting or at a Police station..

A hate crime is any behaviour that someone thinks was caused by hostility, prejudice or hatred of their:

Disability (including physical impairments, mental health problems, learning disabilities, hearing and visual impairments

Gender Identity.

Race, skin colour, nationality.

Religion, faith or belief

Sexual orientation.

Consultation on the New Extra Care Allocations Policy

The new draft Extra Care Allocations Policy has been developed based on how well the previous policy worked whilst taking into account best practice from other Local Authorities. It has also been updated to take into account the draft Property Pool Plus Allocations Scheme alongside the changing landscape of Extra Care in Knowsley.

Knowsley residents and existing Extra Care residents in our schemes are being invited to share their views on the draft Extra Care Allocation Policy, which details the eligibility and process for applying to Extra Care Housing in Knowsley. Respondents will be asked to comment on a draft policy which covers areas such as age, care and financial eligibility.

The earlier liver disease is diagnosed, the better chance of successful treatment.

How the does the scan work?

On the bus, you can access a FREE FibroScan. It is a non-invasive (does not break skin or enter your body) scan of your liver using a device similar to that of an ultra-sound and takes less than 15 minutes. It doesn't hurt.

You will go to a private room on the bus where a member of the team will complete the scan. Once the scan is complete, a member of the team will be able to talk you through your results straight away. You won't get a diagnosis, but we can help you understand and advise on next steps.

Who needs a liver health check?

Anyone can access a liver health check. However, they are generally most helpful for people who are at higher-than-average risk or those who already have a diagnosis of hepatitis B, hepatitis C or liver disease.

To find out if you might be at a higher risk, speak to one of the team. They might ask some questions that seem personal. However, these answers will help us determine possible risk.

Hepatitis C Testing

The Bus also offers the chance to undertake a hepatitis C test. If you think you may have been exposed to Hepatitis C, taking a test will put your mind at rest or, if the test is positive, allow you to start treatment early.

The test will be taken through a simple finger prick test (dried blood spot test), and will be tested rapidly using an:

- Antibody test to find out if you have ever been exposed to the hepatitis C virus
- PCR test to find out if the virus is still active and needs treating

If positive the nurses on the bus can advise of the next steps to ensure you are treated effectively.

If left untreated Hepatitis C can cause serious and life-threatening damage to your liver over time, but with modern treatment it is usually possible to cure the infection and live with a normal life expectancy.
